me. Their eyes lit up when they saw the aircraft on which they had worked all those years ago.

We enjoyed some engaging speakers. Sally Ganem, Nebraska's First Lady, honored members with a proclamation from the Governor. Historian Jim Griffin talked about the canteen in North Platte, Nebraska, which was a regular rail stop during the war. Over a five-year period, volunteers fed thousands of service men each DAY, funded by private donations. Holocaust survivor, Kitty Williams, gave a sobering personal account of her experiences. She thanked the Rosies for helping bring WW II to an end and said they might well have saved her life!

It was very clear that ARRA volunteers put their best foot forward in organizing every detail, from the table decor to the speakers to the Rosie Shoppe. Nice work!

On the last day, there was an announcement that the 2015 convention will take place in Richmond, California, home of the Rosie the Riveter WW II Home Front National Historical Park! Count me in, and my membership dues are in the mail! The legacy of these Americans who contributed so much to the war effort will be preserved, thanks to ARRA. To that end, near the end of the convention, there was a touching Memorial Service in which the names of deceased members were announced and white roses given to those who knew and loved them. I admit to tearing up when I received a rose as the name of my amazing Grandmother, **Alice Elizabeth Riddle**, was mentioned. She was a Rosie and passed away this year.

### They Broke the Record!

On March 29, 2014, 776 people, all dressed as Rosie the Riveter, gathered at the Willow Run Airport in Michigan. Their purpose was not only to break the Guinness World Record for The Largest Gathering of People Dressed as Rosie the Riveter, but also to raise awareness of fundraising efforts to save a portion of WW II's Willow Run B-24 Bomber Plant. They did both! Nineteen actual Rosies participated, and ages of participants ranged



from 3 months to 97. During the war, more than 40,000 workers from across America worked at the Willow Run plant, building more than 8,600 B-24

airplanes. The portion of the building saved will become the new home of the Yankee Air Museum, which presents extensive displays about Rosie the Riveter. ### This Year's Grant Recipient

Melanie W., a ninth grader from Georgia, was awarded an ARRA Student Legacy Grant and is now delivering

her excellent program entitled "Who is Rosie the Riveter?" to senior centers in her area. Melanie is using a display board and computerized videos to supplement her oral presentation. Here are a few excerpts from Melanie's report:



"Who were these women who went to work? They were mothers,

sisters, grandmothers, aunts, daughters... the women of America united and joined the work force. Women were working in numerous jobs including munitions and aviation, both of which did not have many women working in them until WW II.

"Women discovered a new sense of pride, dignity and independence in their work and their lives.... The face of Rosie is the face of millions of women, and Rosies still live today. In fact, my grandmother and her sisters, although only young girls at the time, lived on the Gulf Coast of Florida and helped in the efforts by watching the shoreline."

Congratulations, Melanie, for a job well done in preserving the history and legacy of the Rosies!

Students in grades 9-12 are encouraged to apply for this year's grants! To receive a \$50 grant, the student agrees to research the roles and contributions of Rosies during WW II, then prepare a presentation and present it at least two times to groups such as a history class, civic club, senior center, etc. To request an application and guidelines, contact **Marge Streicker** at <u>marge1st@comcast.net</u>. But act fast! The deadline to <u>return</u> applications is November 1.



First, my family and I want to express heartfelt thanks to those who knew about the passing of my dear husband, John, and expressed your condolences through your prayers, notes and cards, phone messages, and more. My son and daughter, their families, and I have been overwhelmed with your expressions of tenderness and kindness.

John loved you all, and he worked tirelessly for ARRA! He was such a good secretary that I started taking him to lunch on Secretary's Day.

John always said, "I want to live 'til I die," and that was so. He wrote a book in 2013, even after he had a stroke. The book is called *Some Side-Lights of Operation Dragoon*, and includes stories about his time as a paratrooper in the 1944 invasion of southern France. If your family, particularly those who served in WW II, would like a copy, we would like for you to have one. Just send me a note at 209 University Park Drive, Birmingham, AL 35209. Thinking along these lines, I also want to encourage you regarding the idea of our *legacy*. What *is* a legacy? That word is used in our purpose statement: "To recognize and preserve the *history* and *legacy* of working women, including volunteer women, during WW II..."

Melody Bonnette Swang wrote about this idea in the *Daily Guideposts* devotional book on May 30, 2014, the day that ARRA's National Convention began in Omaha. Melody's friend had shown her a new piece of china, and told her how that particular china pattern was a legacy in her family, as three generations of women had chosen it. Then she asked if Melody had such a legacy.

"Oh, no," replied Melody. She explained how her mother and grandmother had never owned any china, but had worked hard and struggled their entire lives just to make ends meet. "My mom quit school when she was a teenager to keep her family going. When she became a single mom with the five of us, she worked two jobs."

"No legacy?" said her friend. "It sure sounds like your grandmother and mother worked very hard, sacrificed a great deal, and did whatever they had to do to keep the family going. If you ask me, that's a pretty awesome legacy."



#### A Tribute to John Carter

If you have ever been to an ARRA Convention before last year, you probably met **Dr. John Carter**, beloved husband of Dr. Fran Carter, ARRA's founder and Executive Director. If you have read the *Mail Call*, you have read many articles that he typed,

proofread, or, on occasion, wrote. If you received one of the four-generation certificates that ARRA prepared in recent years, John created it by hand. In fact, everywhere you look in ARRA, you can see the fingerprints of John Carter, whether you knew it or not, as he worked for the organization constantly alongside Fran.

John passed away on March 2, 2014, at the age of 92. He and Fran were two weeks shy of being married for 68



years. John volunteered for the Army Paratroops, went into southern France in 1944 on a glider plane, and was in the Battle of the Bulge. He returned from the war to marry Fran, then after college, they earned their Masters degrees together at the University of Tennessee, and their doctorates together at the University of Illinois. In

1956, they both joined the faculty of Samford University in Birmingham, where they taught for 30 years, and John retired as Dean of the School of Education in 1987. Along the way, they had 2 children, 7 grandchildren, and (soon to be) 11 great-grandchildren. They were active in Civil



Air Patrol, Freedoms Foundation, and Silver-Haired Congress. In retirement, John and Fran led multiple teams of teachers to conduct workshops in China, Indonesia, and Russia, and participated in medical mission trips to Honduras and Mexico, well into their 80's. John was Executive Director for a national organization, Fellowship of Baptist Educators, matching around 20,000 Chinese high school students with young people in the U.S. through his pen pal project. He and Fran shipped thousands of English books to schools around the world, and built a library/community center at a rural school in Liberia. They gave more than 250 programs as "Rosie and Her Paratrooper" in 17 states, with Fran in her Rosie coveralls and John in his original paratrooper uniform. John taught Sunday School until he was 91, and ushered until 3 weeks before his death. What a lot of living!

Six Rosies who worked at the Kaiser shipyards in Richmond, California made a special trip to Washington, D. C. in March—by special invitation from Vice President Joe Biden! The Rosies received personal tours of the White House, the Vice President's residence, Capitol Hill, and the Pentagon. An extra special moment came during the White House tour, when President Barack Obama made a surprise visit that resulted in a hug and even a kiss! Way to go, ladies!
