Rosebud **Roberta Hite** of Indiana, with the help of her mother, Rosie **Eleanor Hutchens Tyre** of Texas, has a unique way to share the Rosie story. Eleanor gave weather reports to pilots from a tower at Eglin military base during the war. Roberta taught middle school English and U. S. History for 30 years, and each year when her students studied World War II, she made "Mayonnaise Cake" for them, using a recipe from the 1940's that her mother shared with her.



Roberta says, "Their reactions were priceless: many quite hesitant to taste it, some not tasting it at all until classmates reassured them. Over the years this cake developed a reputation, sometimes eagerly awaited for."

Many of you probably saw a recent interview by Brian Williams on NBC Nightly News with a 94-year-old Rosie who is still working as a riveter at Boeing in Long Beach, California. I had the pleasure of talking with her, and learned that she started to work in 1942. After the war and several other jobs, she began to work again as a riveter in Long Beach, where she drives to work and begins her shift of riveting on the wing sections of C-17 cargo planes. She has two sisters who were also Rosies, and I am hopeful we can soon have all three of them on our registry.

A Spectacular Record-Breaking Attempt

On October 30, 2013, at an event sponsored by the Yankee Air Museum in Belleville, Michigan, more than 140 Rosies and Rosie look-alikes gathered to try to set a record for the *Guinness Book of World Records* for the most “Rosies” gathered in one place. Though they didn’t have the 250 ladies and girls needed to set the record, they did have a wonderful time, and they plan to try again at a later date. They also helped to raise awareness about the efforts to save part of the Willow Run bomber plant facility, where B-24 bombers were built during the war. Mayonnaise Cake

Thanks to Rosie **Eleanor Hutchens Tyre** of Texas, and her daughter, **Roberta Hite** of Indiana, for sharing this 1940's recipe. See their story on page 1.

1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees.
2. Grease and flour a 9" x 13" sheet cake pan.
3. In one bowl, mix the following until blended:
 - 1 cup cold water
 - 1 tsp vanilla extract
 - 1 cup real mayonnaise
4. In another bowl, stir together until blended:
 - 2 cups flour
 - 1 cup white sugar
 - 1/2 cup cocoa (I use Hershey's cocoa powder)
 - 1 1/2 tsp baking soda
 - 1/2 tsp salt
5. Add dry ingredients to wet, stir until combined.
6. Pour into prepared cake pan.
7. Bake about 30 minutes.
8. When the cake is cool, I ice it with chocolate frosting.

And Speaking of Recipes...

Here's another wartime recipe sent to us by Rosie **Marjorie Vavra Sams** of Washington. Marjorie says, "We've made this cake many times on the farm where I grew up in Minnesota. We used to make two cakes a day, and my sisters and I did all the baking." After graduation, Marjorie joined her two sisters, who were working at Boeing in Washington state. Marjorie worked in the print shop at Boeing, checking out blueprints to engineers. Thanks for the recipe, Marjorie!

Harvest Hand Cake

- 1/2 cup butter or part other fat
- 1 cup golden table syrup
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 3/4 tsp salt
- 3 cups sifted flour (cake flour, or I use regular flour)
- 2/3 cup milk
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 3 eggs
- 3 tsp baking powder
- 10 ounces semi-sweet chocolate chips

In a big bowl, put fats (soft but not melted), sugar, syrup, salt, cake flour, milk, and vanilla. Beat with a sturdy rotary beater 8 minutes, or with an electric mixer at low speed for 5 minutes. When smooth, beat in eggs, one at a time. Then fold in baking powder. Bake in a large, greased pan (10" x 14") at 375 degrees for 30 minutes. Cool 5 minutes. Sprinkle with 10 oz. semi-sweet chocolate bits. Return to oven (350 degrees) for 2 minutes. Spread softened chocolate. Cool. Cut into 24 large squares. To vary, add 2 tsp cinnamon and 1/2 tsp cloves to the flour.

"Baker's Dozen" Rosies Share Their Stories

Several members of the **Columbus, Georgia/Phenix City, Alabama Chapter** were featured in the Spring 2013 issue of *World War II Quarterly* magazine. Interviews for the article began two years ago at an event at Roosevelt's Little White House. Another article in *Georgia Backroads*, the state's historical magazine, also resulted from those interviews. **Jonnie Clasen** is Chapter President.

This chapter is also sad to report the September death of their only "Allied" member, Rosie **Carlotta "Carrie" Pettitt**. In 1939, the year WW II began in England, Carrie dropped out of school at age 15 to work in a factory for the war effort there. That factory was bombed, so she began working at another one, making racks that held bombs underneath airplanes. When that factory was also bombed, she moved to a third one, making fuses for engineers to use on ships. Carrie and her husband immigrated to the United States in 1959.

Quilts Of Valor

Did you know there is an organization that is dedicated to providing homemade quilts for veterans? It's called the Quilts of Valor Foundation. Their stated mission is "to cover all combat service members and veterans touched by war with comforting and healing Quilts of Valor." In its 10-year history, hundreds of volunteers have made and awarded more than 92,000 beautiful quilts to veterans of all ages across the country.

Traditionally, members of the organization don't just present a patriotic quilt to a veteran—they wrap him or her in it. Recently, the **Birmingham Chapter** of ARRA requested quilts for their three active WW II veterans—

Ralph Jones, Bill Winn, and John Carter. They are pictured below, receiving their exquisite quilts from Elizabeth Mathews (far right), who is the Alabama Coordinator, and her daughter, Kristy Cantrell.
