## Celebrating the 75th Anniversary of the End of WW I I

Rosies, where were you when you heard about the end of the war? Here's what some Rosies said!

When WWII ended, I was working for the War Department in the Pentagon Building. My roommate and I took the trolley to the White House where the celebration was underway. The service men were kissing all the girls and throwing their hats into the air. President Truman came out with a loud speaker to speak to the crowd but due to the noise, we could not hear him. A young Marine was sitting on the curb where the newspapers had just been stacked, and he handed me a paper. The headline was "Truman announces 'War is Over.' " I still have this paper. --Rosie Mabel, AL

I was working in a beauty shop in Detroit, MI at the time I heard the war was over. A group of women went to downtown Detroit. Everyone was going wild celebrating, cheering, hugging and kissing in the streets. ---Rosie Helmi, FL

There was an announcement over the loud speakers at Republic Aviation in Evansville, IN, that the war had ended! Everyone jumped up and hollered - it was pretty wild. Everyone was running up and down the aisleways of the huge factory, hugging each other and yelling, thousands of people. We all stayed and finished work that day, but if I remember correctly, most people were told their job was done. I stayed on for a while to help finish the P-47 Thunderbolts that were already started. --Rosie Dorothy, CA

Living in Ypsilanti, MI, we heard over the radio that the war was over. We joined fellow Willow Run Bomber Plant workers in celebrating in the streets; some were laughing and some were crying, but all were happy it was over. --Rosie Earline, GA

My fellow workers and I went to church thanking the Lord for the victory of our United States of America. --Rosie Caroline, AZ

What sticks out most in my mind is being able to quit my job at Boeing in Washington state and go back home to my parents. I remember the joy that my sister Rose's husband came home safe from the war. --Rosie Florence, OR

I think I was at work on the line in Maryland, and when the word came, I could only have the deepest compassion for those who did not make it home and their families. I did not celebrate. --Rosie Rena, MD

I was in the Stratford town green, and it was late morning. Someone shouted, "The war is over!" And everyone started kissing and hugging and running around. Churches were so filled that day with people giving thanks that the war was over. --Rosie Nancy, CT

My sister and I worked in Los Angeles, and heard the news on the radio. We decided to go downtown and celebrate with everyone else. We only went part-way, because it was too crazy on the streets for two teen-age girls!

--Rosie Dorothy, OR

My Navy officer husband was serving in the Pacific, and I was living in lowa with my parents helping with farm work. We heard on the radio that the war was over!!! This great news gave me hope that my high school sweetheart would be returning soon. It wasn't until Christmas Day he came home --Rosie Louise, IA

When the war ended my sister and I were laid off from Ryan Aeronautical in California, but we understood why. We were happy the war was over and that veterans who were returning home could find jobs. I am very proud of the certificate I have, signed by Mr. Ryan himself. It commends me for my "essential war work" and "loyal faithful service." --Rosie Elinor, NV

When we heard that the war had ended, everybody in Denver just went crazy! The streets were packed with people celebrating. Everybody was kissing everybody. A whole crowd of guys even picked up a streetcar and took it off the tracks! **–Rosie Alice, OR** 

I was at home in Detroit, MI with my mother and two sisters. We had the radio on in the dining room, and we heard the news that the war was over! We all held hands and said a prayer, led by my mother. We were full of mixed emotions, so happy the war was over, but also still grieving the loss of my brother, Sam, who died in the war. Then we went outside, and all the neighbors were outside cheering and thanking God that it was over. We joined in. I don't remember going back to work at the Willow Run Bomber Plant after hearing the news. --Rosie Frances, MI

Anyone of any age can write letters to deployed and newly recruited service members in the Armed Forces! Help ARRA send 7,500 letters for the 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the end of the war! This year's project has already received about 1,000 letters, which is fantastic, but we have a way to go!

Use any kind of notecards or paper, but don't place letters in envelopes. Start with a greeting like "Dear American Hero" and tell a little about yourself or what you love about America. Rosies, tell what you did during the war. Avoid politics completely and religion in excess, but it is fine to say you are praying for them. Above all, thank them for their service! Children may write letters or draw pictures for the troops, too, but should only include their first names. Put all your letters in an envelope and mail to Project Coordinator, Rosebud Linda Wallace

There was shouting and singing and dancing in the streets in Connecticut. The radio broadcasted from many parts of the country, so we could all hear the great celebration around the whole U.S.A. When my cousin got home after being a prisoner in Japan, my aunt threw a huge party in his honor. The entire family was there. --Rosie Marge, CT

The news of victory in Europe was great. But we kept going because B-25's were needed in Japan. That victory came with a great celebration. --Rosie Fern, AZ

I remember all the celebrating and how happy everyone was. People were celebrating all over our city in Texas. --Rosie Wilda, TX

I was in Ocean City, NJ for a short work break when the war ended, and when I got back to the aircraft plant, I was told, "Bring your toolbox and come with me." I was out of a job, with the other gals. My time at the Glenn Martin Company was an exciting time in my life. --Rosie Violet, TX

I was 17 years old in the Seattle area, working for a company under contract with Boeing as a riveter and bucker on P-38's. I was at work when I heard the war was over. We whooped and hollered and had a good time! We were really thrilled. We were so proud we could do something for the boys overseas. --Rosie Fran, AZ

That day I was welding in the inner bottom of a Liberty ship in Savannah, GA. The shift whistle blew, and it was not time for shift change. Everyone gathered and we learned the good news. We were very glad. My mother, older sister, and I worked at the shipyard for two years, and returned to our hometown, Lineville, AL, where I completed my last year of high school and entered Dental Hygiene School in Chicago. --Rosie Jane, GA

I was a farm girl in Iowa, just out of high school, and heard that workers were needed at the Rock Island, IL Arsenal. My parents got me a sleeping room that was about two miles from the Arsenal and I walked to my job every morning and night. I was assigned to fill back orders for supplies needed in the war. The day the war was over, they told us our job ended. --Rosie Dorothy, IA

I am very honored to be a Rosie the Riveter and to have served on the home front. On V-J Day, I joined with the crowd on Michigan Avenue to celebrate the end of the war. --Rosie Jane, MI

When the announcement came in Maryland, everyone got something to make noise with. I put down my drill and went home to celebrate with my brothers who returned from the Navy. --Rosie Wilma, MD
