Rosies Attend Pearl Harbor Remembrances in Honolulu

During the week of December 7, eight original Rosies participated in remembrance events surrounding Pearl Harbor commemorations. They were joined by the

The eight Rosies (pictured above) were Lucille "Cille" MacDonald (HI), who worked as a journeyman welder building ships; Clarice Lafreniere (OR), who worked as a welder and burner in a shipyard;

Caroline Kilgore (AZ), who worked as a bucker and riveter on C-47 Skytrain wings; **Dolores Leonard** (AZ), who gathered milkweed pods to be used in the making of life preservers; **Jeanne Gibson** (CA), who worked as a welder on Navy Destroyers; **Delphine Klaput** (MI), who worked in the tool crib and as a Classified Documents Clerk at an aircraft company;

Virginia Basler (MI), who riveted B-24 Liberator bombers before she joined the SPAR Coast Guard Reserve; and Marian Wynn (CA), who was a pipe welder on Liberty Ships.

ARRA's Vice President for Membership, Rosebud **Jan Davis**, who lives in Hawaii, coordinated a full week of activities, beginning with the Pearl Harbor Aviation Museum's Gala on December 2, followed

by a poster-signing event at the Arizona Memorial Welcome Center. Approximately 450 Rosie fans were limited to asking for one Rosie signature per poster, or the Rosies would have been there for days! Rosie Cille, who is from Maui, invited the whole crew to Cheeseburgers in Paradise, where everyone enjoyed a meal and had a wonderful time visiting.

On December 7, everyone was up extra early for the 82nd Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day commemoration ceremony at 7:00 a.m. Captain Ray Hower, a Marine fighter pilot who is also the great-

nephew of veteran **Lou Conter**, the last living survivor of the *USS Arizona*, gave a very moving speech expressing how important it is for future generations to understand that the "Legacy of Hope" (the theme of the event) was born out of the Greatest Generation. "As descendants of that generation," he said, "we bear a responsibility to honor it, respect it, and build upon it." After the service, a large group of JROTC students met with the Rosies. Then the Navy took the group to view the *USS Arizona* Memorial in the harbor—always a moving experience.

That afternoon the group participated in the Pearl Harbor Memorial Parade down Kalakaua Avenue. It was the largest parade in the event's history. The Rosies waved to their fans from a Waikiki Trolley and had so much fun! The parade audience brought the Rosies to their feet with their excited and enthusiastic cheers!





Want to Honor Your Rosie?

You may know that there is no general list kept anywhere of all the Rosies who worked during WWII, like the



military keeps for veterans. That's why we try to find as many Rosies as possible through word of mouth and add them to ARRA's database!

But did you know that you also can add your family Rosie to ARRA's Rosie the Riveter Honor Roll? It is a beautiful board hosted at the Yankee Air Museum in Belleville,

MI and managed by ARRA's Willow Run (MI) Chapter.

This beautiful commemorative wall display honors each registered Rosie (living or deceased) with a personalized brass plaque showing her name, Rosie workplace, and job description. Adding a plaque costs only \$35. For more information and to receive an application form, email michiganrosies@gmail.com.

A separate place to record your Rosie's service is at the World War II Memorial Registry in Washington, D. C. When you create an online account at https://wwiiregistry.abmc.gov/register-an-honoree/, you can provide information and a photo about WWII veterans and Rosies (living or deceased). The Registry can also be at searched to find information.
